

Directions:

- 1. Read The Crossover by Kwame Alexander -- ISBN 10: 0544935209 ISBN 13: 9780544935204.
- 2. As you read: complete the double entry journal for each section along with the tasks that follow (pages 4-11)
- 3. As you read: complete the theme tracker. Record quotes and pages that will help you get a clearer picture about what the author is trying to teach us about that big idea or what the characters learn about that big idea. (page 3)
- 4. When you finish: Choose one of the project options on the following page to complete. See full description as well as success criteria for this assignment.

Project options

- 1: **Rules**: Compile the basketball rules from the book. Explain how each of these rules applies to life in general. Create a symbol to go along with each of the rules.
- 2: **Graphic Novel**: Tell the story in a visual way. Use a minimum of 6 pages (can be 1/2 pages to create a booklet, if you like) and at least 20 frames to summarize the plot of the novel. Draw the miniature scenes that best visually represent the action. This should be colorful and creative. This may be digital or hand-drawn but should showcase your best work.
- 3: **Playlist**: Create an album cover to represent the book along with a playlist of at least 10 songs that represent both the events and mood of different events and parts of the novel. Songs should be in order. For each of the songs you select, you must include an explanation of how it "fits" the part it portrays. You should plan to write at least two sentences for each song selection. Plan to use songs with school-appropriate lyrics.
- 4: **Another perspective:** Write a diary entry (or more than one) written by another character in the book. Plan to write at least 750 words, and be sure to capture the character (thoughts, feelings, dialogue, actions/reactions) in your work. This entire story is told from Paul's point of view, which gives us an angled view of events, and this is your opportunity to explore another perspective! You can choose to write in verse (mirroring the style of the novel) or simply in diary form.
- 5: **Newspaper:** Create a newspaper for the novel. Your newspaper should include at least three multi-paragraph informational articles about different events from the novel. Be sure to include headlines and pictures for your articles. Give your newspaper a title and date that reflect the setting.
- 6. **Annotated map:** This should be colorful and include a legend. Your map must be annotated, noting key events that occur at each location. You will likely need to use a poster-sized paper for this option.
